PROFAMING THE DEAD. The special committee of the Legielative Assembly, appointed at the beginning of the session, to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Mormon prophet, reported a long screed on Saturday, which was adopted by both Houses. The former leader of this Latter-day Church being in his grave, it would be nothing more than decent for those subordinate priests to leave his momory and his remains unmolested. The evil that men do lives after them; so lot it be with Brigham. has left a record which is rarely equaled for tarpitude, and now be has gone to his account, the scoper the recollection of his ill-deeds lades from the minds of the present generation the better it will be for the icelings of his multitudinous kinsfolk. But these ill-mannered priests must rake over his cold ashes, and produce such a travestie upon his original form and pressure, as will offend the judgment of all who regard for his name. We will reproduce to few of the enperiatives the committee string togother, and lot the reader judge of the gross caricatore they have produocd. They start out with saving: "As a veteran champion in promoting the good and happiness of universal humanity, and as an carnest, faithful server out boa soment rol strooths rights of mon, Brighem Young has stood pre-eminently without a rival." John Howard was nowhere beside him, and Abraham Lincoln, the Liberator, pales into a faint shadow. "Long before the anthorities at Was lington considered the project of a railroad feamble, Governor Young, with the Legislature of the Territory, petitioned Congress to adopt measures for this purpose; and when Goverument inaugurated this movement, it was through the influence of Brigham Young that a contract was engaged and completed, by the entrens of this Territory, of more than one handred miles of this etupendous eaterprise." The deceased prophet has publicly beasted that he made \$300,000 out of this contract, and this sum he netted by subletting the work at a reduced rate, and then taking tithing from the defrauded sub contractors. This vasteum was acquired at the expense of hundreds of his followers who were reduced to bankrupter under the expetions be immedi acan besog " His veneration for the excred Constitution of the United States, which our noble, patrictic foreigthers framed by inepiration of the Almighty. never wavered, even when through mal-administration, it ceased to afford him protection." The culogists forgot to mention that during the Rebellion his devotion to the Constitution was so overpowering, that hoped the fight would continue until both parties had eaten each other up, like the Kilkenny cate; and that he waged war against an army of the United States' cent to Utab to induct Federal officials into their scats. The report seys further: "On Feb. 2d, 1851, he took the oath of office as Governor of the Territory, Commander-in-Quiel of the militia and Superintendent of Indian Affaire. He performed the duties of these offices with integrity, until in the spring of 1857, he was superseded by Governor Cumming." That little adventure at Mountain Mendows, in which a militia regiment took a leading part, the details of which be refused to listen to, because they might "harrow up his feelings;" and his sale of the property left by the blanghtered emigrants for the bouest of the Charch, instead of applying the proceeds religiously to the support of the orphaned anvivore, are not mentioned as being too near the trath for inspired preservation. The pert goals at the expense of the discused prophot is so extravagent as to be really ghasily. promoting education," seys the Lord's parliament, "by the establishment of schools, both the primary and higher departments, he has been noticing in his efforts and nosparing of his means.
