

## CITY JOTTINGS.

A new postoffice has been established at Cub Hill, Cache county.

No mail from the East last night. The Union Pacific train was six hours late.

YESTERDAY strawberries were being peddled around the streets at fifteen cents a quart.

THERE were thirty five deaths in Salt Lake during May, fifteen of which were from diphtheria.

THE Germans of Salt Lake purpose celebrating the golden wedding of Emperor William on the 11th inst.

THE Yosemite excursion party took their departure yesterday afternoon, to continue their journey to California.

THERE was but one case before Justice Pyper yesterday, that of Mrs. Madel, fined \$5 for assault and battery.
